The commission is asked to review the attached information and consider presenting these two groups with \$100 gift cards in July.

CCC PURPOSE STATEMENT

The Clean City Commission was created for the purpose of assisting the common council in establishing a city-wide policy for decreasing the amount of loose refuse in the city.

SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER & ROLL CALL: Chairman Bowman called the meeting to order at 5:01:48 P.M. Six members were present and one member, David Wolf, was absent for the roll call. A quorum of members was achieved. Vice-Chairman Wolf arrived at 5:03 p.m.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:** The Clean City Commission reviewed the April 16, 2015 regular meeting minutes. Commissioner Russell made a motion to APPROVE the April 16, 2015 meeting minutes as written. Commissioner Carpenter SECONDED and the MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY with a vote of 6-0.

2. **AWARDS AND RECOGNITION:**
 - a. **Certificate of Appreciation.**
Chairman Bowman read a letter to the editor written by 8-year old Chris Buck that was published in the Kingman Daily Miner on December 31, 2014. On behalf of the Clean City Commission, Chairman Bowman and Vice-Chairman Wolf then presented a certificate of appreciation to Chris Buck for his efforts. Photos of the presentation were taken by Eddie Tapia, Sanitation Superintendent.

 - b. **Chuck Gibson Community Challenge Awards.**
On behalf of the Clean City Commission, Chairman Bowman and Vice Chairman Wolf presented certificates of appreciation and gift cards in the amount of \$100 to two organizations, KYC BUTT and the Cedar Hills 4-H Club. The Community Challenge Awards are presented to youth-oriented clubs and organizations that benefit the Kingman community. KYC-BUTT was awarded for their work in cleaning up an area along Stockton Hill Road and the removal of cigarette butt litter from several city parks. The Cedar Hills 4-H Club was awarded for cleaning up and painting a residence at the Manzanita Baptist Church property at 2022 Golden Gate Avenue.

3. **OLD BUSINESS**

- a. **Review of Bag Donation Requests and Discussion of Methods to Reduce Plastic Bag Litter.**
Staff Liaison Rich Ruggles told the Clean City Commission (CCC) that letters were sent to local grocery stores including Smith's, Wal-Mart, Bashas' and Safeway, over the past couple of months. The letters requested reusable bag donations from the stores. These bags are proposed to be coupled with the reusable bags that the CCC purchased for the proposed bag giveaway. The north Safeway grocery store previously said they would participate. Mr. Ruggles stated that Bashas' responded to the request and will send a case of 100 reusable bags to the local Bashas' store for us to pick up.

The CCC discussed whether they should set a date to distribute bags and agreed to wait until the stores got bags in hand before setting a date. Smith's is waiting on corporate approval before they can donate any bags. Commissioner Hicks said she will be talk with new Wal-Mart manager about the request for bag donations. Chairman Bowman said he would like to pass out magnets with the reusable bags.

Commissioner Hicks asked about the plastic bags the City of Kingman collects and sends to Phoenix for recycling. Eddie Tapia confirmed that bag drop off location at Bashas' is collecting one bale a month which equals about 1 ton of plastic bags. Recently, Sanitation took seven bales of plastic bags to a new vendor who pays one cent per pound. Now, Bashas' will be taking the bales which will help with the cost of transportation. Bashas' is the only store working with the City to take the bales of bags to Phoenix for recycling. Otherwise, local grocery stores that do have bag collection bins take care of their own bag recycling. Additionally, 60-70 lbs. a day are being dropped off at eight City of Kingman plastic bag recycling drop sites located throughout Kingman.

The commission decided to discuss this item again in June to give the stores more time to obtain reusable bags and to respond to requests for reusable bag donations. Chairman Bowman requested that Staff Liaison Rich Ruggles prepare posters related to educating the public on plastic bag recycling. These will be used at future recyclable bag giveaways.

- b. **Airway Avenue Clean-up.**
Staff Liaison Rich Ruggles advised the CCC that he spoke with Krystal Burge's assistant recently. Ms. Burge is the owner of property on Airway Avenue which collects a lot of trash that blows from Smith's and Wal-Mart. Krystal Burge is happy to work with the CCC on keeping this area clean. She does not have a group that they could schedule for regular cleanups but there are several groups that do regularly clean this property such as KYC BUTT and other groups supervised by Police Chief DeVries. Mr. Ruggles said that he has not received a response from Smith's or Wal-Mart regarding developing a clean-up schedule.

Chairman Bowman asked if the CCC needed to ask permission to do a clean-up at that location. Mr. Ruggles clarified that the area of clean-up is in the public right-of-way and so the CCC did not have to ask permission from any of the property owners. Chairman Bowman suggested that the CCC should set a clean-up schedule for one day a month and should contact Police Chief DeVries to make sure there are no conflicts with the clean-up schedules. Chairman Bowman

asked Staff Liaison Rich Ruggles to obtain information regarding the Chief's clean up schedule. Once this information is received, the CCC will set their schedule.

4. **NEW BUSINESS**

a. **Community Clean-up Discussion.**

Chairman Bowman stated that the Community Clean-up on May 9, 2015, at the Mohave County Fairgrounds had an extremely low turnout. The event ran smoothly because everything was in place and the event started 15 minutes early. A survey was conducted by Sherie Sixkiller-Wing at the event in order to track the number of customers who attended the event and whether they lived within the city or county boundaries.

Staff Liaison Rich Ruggles presented the outcome of the survey. There were a total of 94 customers. 38 customers resided within the city and 56 were in the county. The percentage was 40% of the customers were from the City and 60% were from the County. Some customers made a couple of return trips to the clean-up on Saturday, but these people were counted only once in the survey.

Chairman Bowman mentioned that more customers had bagged their trash prior to arriving to the event and so the advertising may have made more of an impact on this clean up due to the number of people arriving with their trash already bagged. Chairman Bowman only had to go the dumpsters twice which is less than previous clean ups.

Eddie Tapia agreed that the advertising and flyers helped educate the public regarding the clean-up and congratulated the Clean City Commission for getting the flyers out and advertising.

Chairman Bowman thanked Eddie Tapia for a job well done by his crew. Commissioner Hicks wondered if the dumpsters on Topeka Street impacted the reduction of customers at the clean-up. Mr. Tapia stated that on average, his crew is dumping two of the three dumpsters every other day and agreed that they probably did reduce the number of customers and there was progress with people cleaning up on that side of town.

Chairman Bowman mentioned E.R.A.C.E. held recent clean up events which also may have led to the reduction of customers at the clean-up. Also, only seven vouchers were passed out to customers to take their trash to the landfill. Vice-Chairman Wolf passed out the vouchers and stated there were no issues with them.

Commissioner Russell mentioned that due to the cooperation of the prison, the normal amount of customers could be served. There were two compactors and two dumpsters going with plenty of people help and there were no more than five cars in line at one time. The shredder service was on time and stayed for a couple of hours and left. He did not have many customers; only three to four cars.

b. **CARE Sandbox Meeting Discussion.**

Commissioner Russell mentioned that the CARE Sandbox meeting will not be held until next week. The house property clean-up on Atlantic and Stockton Hill Road had to be postponed on April 25th due to rain and has been rescheduled for Saturday, May 30th at 7:30 am. The event should not last more than two hours. The delay was also due to the rock not being delivered. The

big rocks are already on site. A bunch of stuff was taken out of the house by the property owner and placed in the carport area which looks like a trash disposal. The appearance of the property is not improving even though we are helping the property owner clean up the landscaping.

c. Information Regarding Meeting Attendance.

Staff Liaison Rich Ruggles presented information to the CCC regarding the expectation of commissioners to attend the meetings. If a commissioner cannot attend, please call Mr. Ruggles, Sherie Sixkiller-Wing or Chairman Bowman at least 24 hours before the absence unless it is an emergency. If a commissioner has three or more unexcused absences in a year can be cause for removal.

Commissioner Hicks stated that when you are part of a committee you should be committed to attending meetings because everyone is depending on you. There was a previous CCC meeting where a quorum was not present and there were many people in attendance, yet the CCC could not hold the hearing. Commissioner Giesbrecht stated that he feels it is a privilege to be on a commission and if you cannot fulfill the responsibility, please remove yourself and give the seat to someone else.

Chairman Bowman also recalled along with Commissioner Hicks the meeting where the quorum was not met and agreed along with of the importance for commissioners to attend CCC meetings.

5. CALL TO THE PUBLIC - COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

City Manager John Dougherty mentioned that the City of Kingman is a finalist in the ABC Challenge which stands for America's Best Cities Challenge. He requested that the CCC take pictures before and after of clean-ups so we can show ABC committee that the community is very active and works together on these clean ups. It was unfortunate that pictures were not taken of Ramblin Rose because it was a dramatic change of appearance. Please videotape or take pictures and send them to Yvonne at the Chamber of Commerce. She will include them in the packet of information showing that Kingman is active and working very hard to keep the community clean. This will also go a long ways to show our commitment in getting various groups out working in trying to improve the community.

Kingman is one of only two communities in Arizona which has advanced past the first round. The other city is a rich one not far from here. Show Low did not make it neither did Bullhead City. We should be very proud that we got this far but we still want the \$3 million dollars grand prize.

Chairman Bowman asked if there was anything that the CCC could do to help. City Manager Dougherty responded that right now we are working with a small team but would like to expand it out and add various groups such as the Cruisers, Beale Celebrations, youth groups, and get senior citizens involved. We need to show that we have a very large coalition and so that is what we are working on. Originally our budget for this round was \$50,000 and the corporation that is helping us is contributing another \$15,000 dollars and so now, we have a \$65,000 dollar budget. We gave a list of local companies that could raise another \$15,000 to Yvonne because we have to raise the money from the city in order to participate. We figured out that it would be a contribution of \$500 per corporation and we didn't think it would be a big deal for anybody.

Chairman Bowman mentioned that he worked last year with United Way for the festival clean up and we should get that going again. City Manager Dougherty said that we are having a Best of West on 66 and he would like to get the area cleaned up before then. Chairman Bowman will contact United Way to help with the clean-up because the City looked really good after the last clean-up. There were 400 people that were involved in the clean-up.

The City Manager responded that it shows how much the community does care when they are asked and gets involved which will boost us tremendously for Americas Best Cities. We are a small community but when the time comes we pull together and get things done.

Commissioner Russell said he took pictures of Rambling Rose before and after and asked who to provide pictures too. The City Manager responded that he should send the photos to Yvonne at the Chamber of Commerce.

Commissioner Hicks said there is a motel across from the Rutherford's Family Diner, the Desert Lodge, and lot next to the Hotel Beale that are getting cleaned up. She was wondering if there were before and after photos.

Council Liason Stuart Yocum commented at how truly fantastic it would be if we ended up winning, coming in first and winning the whole thing. City Manager Dougherty agreed that 3 million would go a long way along with the \$50,000 and the \$100,000.

6. ANNOUNCEMENTS BY COMMISSION MEMBERS.

Commissioner Giesbrecht announced his resignation from the commission due to health reasons. He also mentioned upcoming Chillin' on Beale event on May 16th.

Commissioner Van Hasselt mentioned that there is a 3rd final public hearing being held on 5-15-15 at 9 am in Chino Valley related to the I-11 Corridor.

Council Liaison Yocum mentioned that the next Care Sandbox meeting will be held at the Garlic Clove instead of KPD.

ADJOURNMENT: Commissioner Hicks made a MOTION to ADJOURN the meeting. Commissioner Carpenter SECONDED and the MOTION and CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY with a vote of 6-0. Meeting Adjourned at 5:43:19 P.M.

Subject: **ITEM #2a: Review of Bag Donation Requests and Methods to Reduce Plastic Bag Litter**

The Clean City Commission has been distributing donated reusable grocery bags to customers at local grocery stores and other locations at various times for more than two years. This is being done to encourage the use of reusable bags and discourage the use of plastic bags. The Clean City Commission has purchased 250 reusable shopping bags from RecyclingPromotions.com with the CCC logo on the bags. We have over 400 CCC magnets left to distribute with the bags.

We have requested additional matching donations from several area grocery stores including the north Safeway, Bashas', Smith's, and Wal-Mart. Jimmy Van at the north Safeway indicated he would be willing to participate in the promotion. Bashas' already donated 100 bags which I picked up last month. Abdul at Smith's said he sent the request to their corporate office for approval, but I have not heard if this has been approved. A second letter was sent to Wal-Mart after there was no response initially as they have recently hired a new manager. Commissioner Hicks was going to speak with the new manager.

Any updates to this information will be discussed at the meeting. The commission may also set a date for the reusable bag distribution.

Additionally, Sylvia Shaffer has prepared five examples of art work that could be used to help educate the public about reducing plastic bag litter in our community. Attached to this memo are small versions of the art work which could be used as flyers or be printed as large posters. The commission is asked to review the art work and choose one or more that can be displayed when the CCC distributes the reusable bags.







The Clean City Commission has proposed to develop a schedule with Smith's, Wal-Mart, and other property owners along Airway Avenue to regularly clean up a portion of Airway Avenue between Stockton Hill Road and the Mohave Wash. Letters were sent to these stores on February 19, 2015 and on March 31, 2015 to SKM Investments (Krystal Burge), which owns vacant property along this portion of Airway Avenue.

Krystal Burge is supportive of the clean-ups and there have been a number of groups that have done clean-ups in the area. This includes Chief DeVries' 1st offenders who are required to do community service, a Girl Scout troop, and the St. John's Youth Group. At the last meeting the commission gave the direction that we would try to coordinate the clean-ups with Chief DeVries to make sure we were not doing them at the same time. I have asked the Chief to provide us a clean-up schedule. If I receive a schedule, I will bring it to the meeting. As of the writing of this memorandum I have not received a response from Smith's or Wal-Mart.

The commission is asked to discuss this matter and give direction to staff on further efforts.

We were honor to be chosen for the Kingman Clean City Community Youth Grant candidates. We apology for the late submission to fulfill our commitment for the Chuck Gibson Community Youth Grant, due to the State competition with FIRST Lego League and Kingman FIRST Robotics Team 60. We are delighted to complete our community service during the Summer Lego Camp, with the one week theme focusing on "Trash Trek."

For the one week of Summer Lego Camp from June 1 to June 5, over 50 youth participants from third grade to eight grade, were introduce to the 2015 Lego League theme: "Trash Trek." Catching scientists early with some robot fun

KINGMAN - The Kingman FIRST Robotics Team 60 has had a busy couple of weeks. After taking first in the AIA State Robotics Championships on May 23, the team had one week off before putting on its annual LEGO League Summer Camp at home.

The camp, which runs through Friday, was open to third- through eighth-graders. Participants had the opportunity to learn how to design, build, program and test autonomous robots by using eight LEGO Mindstorms kits. Each kit consists of a brain and a combination of motors and sensors, with the body and arms constructed out of LEGO bricks and pieces.

Over 50 students participated over both sessions.

At the camp, students are presented with a game table and a problem to solve. They are divided up into teams, and the rest is up to them with the help of mentors from Robotics Team 60.

"We're trying to get them interested in the program at an early age," said Celeste Lucier, Robotics Team advisor for Kingman Academy and mentor for Team 60. Lucier advises the club with Jody Schanaman from Lee Williams High School and Kerry Schanaman at Kingman High School.

Every year the students from Team 60 design a game table for the students of the summer LEGO League to compete in. This year, teams at the camp were tasked with picking up pieces of trash on the table and delivering them to one side of the table. Points are given for successfully transporting different pieces of trash like glass, paper and cardboard. They also get bonus points if they can put the trash into a cup.

Lucier pointed out that all the commands for the robot are pre-programmed on the computer beforehand, and that robots have to rely on a variety of light, touch, and ultrasonic sensors to navigate the game and complete the tasks.

The theme ties in with the official FIRST LEGO League Season starting in August, titled "Trash Trek." The season is open to schools and groups nationwide.

Lucier estimates that Kingman will have two to four teams at various schools participating in the 10-week program.

For this week's camp, teams have the week to tweak and perfect their robots, with competition commencing Friday afternoon.

Regardless if the robot works at the end or not, Lucier said that the camp focuses on teamwork, learning and fun.

Kingman students take top prize at first robotic championship

KINGMAN - The Kingman FIRST Robotics Team 60 was one of three Arizona teams that won state championship trophies recently in the inaugural Arizona Interscholastic Association State Robotics Championships.

"It was pretty cool to get a chance to make history by participating in the first-ever AIA State Robotics Championships, then going on to win it," said participant Joseph Scholl. "That was superb."

Team 60, known as the Bionic Bulldogs, formed an alliance with two other teams - the Boxer Bots and Team Westwood - to outscore 27 other teams. Each team in the winning alliance received trophies and was crowned the first robotics champions of the AIA.

"We knew we were going in strong by being consistent, and we knew that's what we needed to win this game," said participant John Lewis. "Winning the state championship means that all of our hard work paid off in the end."

The event, which took place May 23 at the Prescott Valley Events Center, featured a game called Recycle Rush that is played by two alliances of three robots each. Robots score points by stacking totes on scoring platforms, capping those stacks with recycling containers, and properly disposing of foam pool noodles that represent litter.


Since Team Westwood earned the top spot after preliminary rounds, it was the first to select its Red Alliance of the Bionic Bulldogs and the Boxer Bots. They battled the Blue Alliance of Tempe Prep, Saguaro and Carl Hayden.

To win, an alliance had to take two out of three timed Recycle Rush games. The Red Alliance won the first two games, which gave them the victory and secured their place in the state's newest AIA competition.


