PLANNING & ZONING COMMISSION MEETING MAY 9

Zoning Ordinance Text Amendment Case ZO17-0001—Request for a text amendment to consider allowing banners honoring active military personal to be attached to City light poles on a year round basis—**Commissioners voted (7-0) to recommend amending Section 25.110 as suggested by staff, to exempt the military banners from being regulated through the Sign code.**



CITY OF KINGMAN – UTILITY PAYMENT STATISTICS

The primary source of payment for utility customers continues to be checks—almost 36-percent of customers continue to use this method. Debit and credit card payments are the second-most used method at 29-percent. Of that 29-percent, over 70-percent of payments received are through the IVR telephone payment system. The IVR system continues to attract interest from utility customers and electronic payments overall, such as bank draft, online bill payments through customer banks and the IVR system, account for more than 58-percent of customer payments.






**General Fund
Fiscal Year to Date 2017**





(In Thousands of Dollars)**





Kingman Fire Department

Fire Chief—Jake Rhoades

The Kingman Fire Department responded to 462 calls during the month of May. Response numbers continue to demonstrate a downward trend in comparison to one year ago. Once again, the department is ensuring that the tiered response system for emergency medical incidents is truly working as it is designed and utilizing priority dispatch. The tiered response system consists of Kingman Regional Medical Center, American Medical Response (AMR) and Kingman Fire Department, all of which have seen an increase in response capability as the right resource is sent to the right location at the right time. The system has become stronger through this system and continues to build operational relationships for long lasting success.

The department ran a pilot program to increase the trained members of the technical rescue team as members of C- Shift completed rope rescue training which serves as the foundation for all rescue disciplines. These disciplines may be low frequency but the risks associated are very high and, as such, the training requirements are very specialized and demanding due to the critical nature of each discipline. However, the risks associated with the types of responses and their probability within the city demand that all personnel are prepared for any such emergency. Training and development of personnel continues to be a priority for the department on all levels.

The department underwent a site visit with assessors from the Commission on Fire Accreditation International and took one step closer to becoming an Accredited agency. The team of assessors consisted of chief officers from organizations across the county, Colorado, Alabama, Ohio, and the United States Navy. Preparation is constant to prepare for this process in an effort to become just one of 12 departments in the state of Arizona to obtain this distinction and only one of 300 internationally to do the same. They unanimously recommended KFD for accredited status and the next step will be an appearance at the commission hearings in July at Fire Rescue International In Charlotte, NC. Recommendations were made regarding various aspects of the department and its operations including the use of incident safety officers, air handling at fire station 2, and the adoption and review of operating procedures in Human Resources and Finance. All of these recommendations have been realized and a strong commitment will be made to address them in a timely fashion. Overall, the site visit went fantastic and the greatest compliment received was when the assessors stated, "you do not have a department, you have a family." As the Fire Chief of the Kingman Fire Department, I could not agree more.





BUILDING AND LIFE SAFETY DIVISION

The Building and Life Safety Division is starting to become more and more organized as the members of the city's Building department come together with Fire Prevention Specialists to form this new division. A strict attention to details and customer service continue to be the focus as time moves along. Realizing the importance of analyzing processes and levels of comfort within the Division provides opportunities for these members to demonstrate continuous improvement and meet the current needs of the city as well as the future of growth and development. A focus on cross-training of fire prevention staff and building department staff has led to challenges but an already recognizable difference in the level of service to the community. This cross-training even includes secretarial support staff including a permit technician, administrative secretary and administrative assistant. Positive results are already being seen and the concept of a "one stop shop" for the city of Kingman citizens and developers working to grow the city.

The cross training of Fire Prevention and Building department staff picked up speed with each group intertwining in various on-site inspections and trainings.

Finally, the reassignment of a Fire Prevention specialist to focus solely upon Community Risk Reduction was made in order to address this ever-critical area of the fire service and support the mission of education, engineering and enforcement in order to proactively prevent fires and other emergencies within the city.



May Highlights Vehicle Theft, Unlawful Flight from Police and Aggravated Assault on Officers—Tuesday, May 23, at 8:50 a.m., Kingman Police arrested Damien Christopher Moore, 29 of Kingman,



on the following felony charges: Aggravated Assault on Police Officer (3 counts), Criminal Damage (2 counts), Theft of Motor Vehicle and Unlawful Flight from Law Enforcement. At 8:30 a.m. Moore stole a green in color Kia Soul from a car sales lot in the 3800 block of N. Stockton Hill Rd. It was reported that Moore entered the vehicle as employees were moving vehicles around the sales lot. Moore left in the stolen vehicle southbound on Stockton Hill Rd. and was last seen going westbound on I-40 from Stockton Hill Rd. Several minutes later officers located Moore, driving the stolen Kia Soul, in the downtown Kingman area. Moore fled when an officer attempted to stop the stolen vehicle.

At the intersection of W. Beale St. and Grandview Ave. Moore, who had been driving recklessly at high rates of speed,



purposefully crashed into a police SUV that was stopped in the intersection, and then collided with two other police SUVs.

Moore was taken into custody without further incident when the stolen vehicle became disabled between two police SUVs.

Two officers received minor injuries. One police vehicle sustained significant damage while two others had relatively minor damage.

The stolen Kia Soul received significant damage to its front end. Moore was booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility. It is not known if Moore was under the influence of anything.



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Officer Involved Shooting, Suspect Dead—Sunday, May 14th, at about 7:30 p.m. Kingman Police Department assisted the Mohave County Sheriff’s Office in the pursuit of a suspect wanted for Aggravated Assault that occurred in Wikieup, AZ earlier in the evening. The pursuit ended on Andy Devine Ave. near the I-40 intersection where officers shot and killed the suspect. The Arizona Department of Public Safety is conducting the criminal investigation. Andy Devine Ave. at I-40 was closed for several hours during the investigation. The Kingman Police Officer involved in the shooting has been placed on administrative leave which is standard protocol for this type of incident.

***DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY RELEASE—STABBING SUSPECT FLEES FROM MULTIPLE LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES—Update May 22, 2017—Suspect:** David Jay Juarez, 41, from Texas (deceased) **Law Enforcement Officers Involved:** Sergeant Dave Coffin, 18 years of service with the Kingman Police Department Trooper Matthew Drury, 16 years of service with the Arizona Department of Public Safety.- **End Update - Sunday, May 14, 2017 - 7:00pm**

Kingman, AZ—Sunday evening, **May 14, 2017**, at about **7:02 p.m.** the Mohave County Sheriff’s Office (MCSO) contacted the Arizona Department of Public Safety (AZDPS) to request assistance with a pursuit of a stabbing suspect driving a pickup truck. MCSO reported that the suspect had stabbed two people prior to fleeing. MCSO informed the troopers their deputies were **Northbound on SR93** and asked that troopers assume command of the pursuit if it reached **I-40**.

As the suspect entered I-40 going Westbound from the SR 93 junction he began making erratic lane changes, endangering those traveling on the interstate. As requested, troopers assumed command of the pursuit. As the pursuit continued on I-40, troopers, along with officers from the Kingman Police Department, set up road spikes in three locations on I-40.

After striking two sets of road spikes the suspect exited I-40 at **Andy Devine Avenue** and began traveling South in the Northbound lanes, with troopers, deputies and officers following on the Southbound side. The pickup then made a U-turn, driving Northbound on Andy Devine Avenue, continuing to flee from law enforcement vehicles. A Kingman Police Officer and a trooper discharged their firearms at the suspect’s vehicle and the suspect and vehicle were struck during the exchange. The suspect died at the scene. The Arizona Department of Public Safety is conducting both an administrative and criminal investigation of this incident. This is the information available at this time. The investigation is ongoing.

Felony Arrest on Drug Related Charges—Friday, May 12 at approximately 9:10 a.m., Kingman Police arrested **Nicholas William McCoy**, 20 of Kingman, in the 2200 block the Kingman Ave. on felony charges of Possession of a Dangerous Drug, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and a misdemeanor a charge of Possession of Marijuana. This arrest was the result after police responded to a disturbance in the 2200 block of Kingman Ave. where a male subject was attempting to fight with customers. Officers contacted the male subject identified as McCoy who was found in possession of methamphetamine, marijuana and drug paraphernalia. McCoy was ultimately booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility.

Wanted Fugitive Dies in Crash—Wednesday, May 10th, at about 9:50 p.m., **Kevin Marcus Robertson**, 37 of Modesto, CA, was killed in a one vehicle crash in the 100 block of E. Andy Devine Ave. At about 9:30 p.m. the Kingman Police Department was contacted by authorities in Modesto, CA who had information that Kevin Marcus Robertson, who was wanted on a felony warrant for Child Molestation issued by the Modesto (CA) Police Department, was in the Kingman area.

It was reported that Robertson was despondent, suicidal and believed to be armed with a handgun. At 9:30 p.m. a KPD officer located Robertson and his vehicle in the parking lot of a business in the 1900 block of E. Andy Devine Ave. Robertson refused the officers commands and fled in his vehicle Westbound on E. Andy Devine Ave. Robertson's vehicle reached speeds in excess of 95 mph. Upon entering the 100 block of E. Andy Devine Ave. Robertson's vehicle struck the Power House Visitor Center sign post. Robertson was killed in the crash. AZ Department of Public Safety was asked to investigate the crash. It is unknown at this time if Robertson crashed intentionally. The roadway was closed until 7 a.m. when AZ DPS concluded

their scene investigation and opened the roadway. The Modesto Police Department was notified. KPD, AZ DPS and the Modesto Police Department are working together and the investigation is on-going.



Four Counts of Crash and Arrest for Endangerment—Saturday, May 6th, at 11:15 a.m., Kingman Police arrested **Walter Lee Palmer Sr.**, 47 of Kingman, on four (4) felony counts of Endangerment after it was determined that he was responsible for the crash of a vehicle he and four other people were

riding in. Officers had responded to a two-vehicle crash on Andy Devine Ave. near the I-40 Eastbound on-ramp where one vehicle had rolled over. It was determined during the investigation that Palmer was involved in an argument inside the car where in he is alleged to have grabbed a phone out of the hand of the driver which caused the vehicle to veer and crash into another vehicle in the next lane and continue onto the Eastbound onramp where it rolled onto its side. Palmer and the other four occupant's (ages 72, 23, 21 and 10) received minor injuries. The occupants of the second vehicle where not injured. Walter L. Palmer was arrested and subsequently booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility.

PARKS MAKE LIFE BETTER

PARKS DEPARTMENT

The Parks maintenance Division completed 19 maintenance repair orders in the mechanics shop, nine in in the parks system and 14 in pools and recreation. The parks Department has utilized 288 hours of inmate labor. We have experienced one incident of vandalism in the parks system.

Parks Maintenance—Manual weeding continues in the Roadside landscape areas, the I-40 walk path is now receiving the treatment and clean up.

PARKS MAINTENANCE (continued)

Crews completed the compost application at Centennial and Southside Parks. They will apply granular fertilizer to supplement the turf for the up and coming state championship later this month.

All Park irrigation systems are back up to full run times. With the heat increasing daily we have both cycles at 100% of the scheduled watering times and have returned to the five-day a week mowing schedules with two times a week for the sports turf fields.

Weed Abatement—We have been concentrating on the Airway underpass with an application of post/pre-emergent herbicide and have also been working on the Route 66 roadside from Stockton Hill to the Martin Swanty dealership.

Splash Pad—Crews have had an entire month of seven-days-a-week operation of the Splash Pad. There was a minor event involving one of the water feature actuators. Unknown persons repeatedly hit the actuator with a large rock causing damage and allowing moisture to accumulate on the circuit board. This put the water feature in a default mode and override for the run times.

A perimeter fence has been installed around the concrete surface of the Splash Pad which has resulted in a major reduction of traffic into the landscaping rock and accumulated dirt in the filter system. The reduction is as much as 50% associated with the backwash and cleaning of the filters.

The donated construction portion of the solar ramada is complete with the system online and making power for the grid. It will take the total accumulated energy from the whole year to insure the credit for the offset power needed to operate the Splash Pad.

We continue to move forward with the final landscaping around the new solar ramada. The concrete curb is complete and final clean up and installation of the landscaping has begun. Anew ADA picnic table and BBQ will be installed for one more ramada available for rental in the Parks system.



CERBAT CLIFFS GOLF COURSE

All greens have been given a liquid application of growth regulator, fungicide and fertilizer. Crew have also completed a granular application of gypsum as well as a liquid application of fertilizers to all fairways, greens and tees. This application helps to ensure healthy root development.

All tees, aprons, fringes and approaches have been given a liquid application of fertilizer and herbicide to control broad leaf weeds.

Several weak turf areas on the approaches and fairways are being top dressed with a sand and compost mixture and then airtied to strengthen the turf and increase irrigation absorption.

Weed eradication throughout the entire course has been completed. To reduce the use and cost of pesticide, timely applications at the lowest percentages possible is the goal.

Now that summer heat has arrived overnight irrigation is being reduced and spot watering is being done during the day. The manual hose reeling of greens, fringes and approaches has begun. Water conservation while continuing to keep the turf properly irrigated to keep the course in great playable condition is very important.

The crew has repaired a 10-foot long, four-inch main line break on the #11 fairway. Luckily this break was discovered very quickly. We still encounter the original blue pipe on the course and replace it as needed.

Safety continues to be a high priority. Monthly meetings and updates from the general safety committee keep the crew up-to-date.

Since the last report the golf course has utilized 472 hours of inmate labor.

Dirt road grading, pothole patching, patching of water utility cuts, shoulder grading and accident cleanup. Shoulder maintenance, due to damage from past storms, has been ongoing throughout the month. Large repairs and complaints are expected to be completed next month. The next phase of repairs and upgrades will include placing millings on dirt roads.


Street Department Activities (continued)

- The City was granted 20,000 tons of asphalt millings from ADOT. This project has been attempted over the last couple months but, storm cleanup and staffing levels have prevented this work. Half streets/blocks have been prioritized first. The remaining balance of millings will be used on two roads selected due to drainage issues. This will be a long project due to staffing levels and work required. Dirt removed from selected roads will be utilized for shoulder maintenance to reduce trucking. Completion of this project is of high importance as the millings represent a \$160,000 dollar asset to the City. This does not include the reduced maintenance that will be achieved as a result of plating roads with millings. No time limit has been imposed but, multiple agencies are trying to obtain the millings. This asset could be lost if not used quickly as the materials are not guaranteed. Approximately 19,000 cubic yards are left to be moved. Placement of millings will continue but progress is slow due to maintenance needs and current staffing levels. This project will continue until completion or the materials grant is revoked.
- Work to prepare for the upcoming chip seal project has been ongoing and will continue until completed. Chip seal is expected to start the beginning of June and will continue until completed. Chip seal is expected to be completed the last week of June.
- Pothole repairs have been ongoing throughout the month. The years of deferred maintenance and wet weather have caused excessive damage to our paved assets. Andy Devine still requires repairs for extensive potholes. Council approved milling of Andy Devine between 8th and Hall St. The asphalt was only milled and will not be replaced until ADA facilities have been upgraded. The ADA upgrades should be completed next fiscal year.


PROJECTS

- **LED Signal Replacements**—All traffic signals were updated to LED lights. This was to conserve energy but, was mainly a component of installment of battery backup units (BBU). The BBU's were installed and brought on line. These units have batteries which will power the signal in the event of a power outage which will improve safety at intersections during power outages.
- **Weed Abatement**—Spraying of herbicides was ongoing throughout the month and will continue until late fall. On days that winds exceed allowable limits the two-man crew runs the brush hog in overgrown areas. This is only preemptive work to slow the growth of weeds which the City is responsible for. It is expected that a significant amount of time will be spent cutting weeds in areas which should be completed by the property owner/tenant. This has been a problem in the past due to the difficulty in enforcing City Ordinances related to weed abatement. A temporary crew will be hired to work on weed abatement as long as the budget allows.
- **Rutherford**—Millings were placed on Rutherford South of Airway which will improve travel and reduce maintenance. Approximately 19,500 cubic yards are left to be moved. Placement of millings will continue until completion or the materials grant is revoked.
- **HA5 Asphalt Treatment**—Holbrook Asphalt has started crack sealing City streets selected for HA5 treatment. This work was completed in early May with application of HA5 in May and June.






