Diamond Chemical has purchased Industrial Park property Luseaux Laboratories

The Roads Petition and three Road Grants at the Industrial Park were approved by Mohave County BOS

New Economic Development website choosekingman.com has gone live, with a project link for Opportunity Zone's available to our area added to the Prospectus on the new site.

CDBG Project #102-18, ADA Improvements—Crews have completed the final ramps, driveways and curb cuts for Phase 1 of this grant funded improvement.

One bid was received for the Kingman Airport Terminal Tenant Improvement from Axiom Construction for \$85k.

- ◆ Gary Kellogg, Planning and Economic Development Director, has joined the Workforce Development Group with members of Mohave and La Paz County. The group seeks to enhance the region's economic stability and prosperity by focusing on people rather than businesses.
- ◆ Staff assisted with video filming to be used on the new Economic Development website and Government Access Channel 4 commemorating the one year anniversary of the partnership between the City and the Kingman Airport and Industrial Park
- ◆ Mr. Kellogg spoke at two Rotary Club meetings in April on updates and improvements to the Airport and Industrial Park since the City took ownership.
- ◆ Staff has been working on preparations for an Economic Development Summit and partnering with Mohave Community College






Kingman, Arizona Budget to Actual Expenditures Fiscal Year 2019





**Due to the implementation of a new utility billing software, November utility bills were delayed. This resulted in a decrease in year-to-date revenues. Utility billing is expected to reach its normal billing frequency by late December/early January, at which time the year-to-date revenues will align with the prior year's reported revenues.

City of Kingman – Utility Billing Enhancements

The Utility Billing and Licensing division launched a utility billing online payment portal in November 2018. This portal accepts one-time and recurring credit card and electronic checks as payment methods. It also allows customers to view their utility bills online. In addition to launching an online payment portal, customers now have the option to receive their bills electronically through email. This service can be activated through the online payment portal, <https://selfservice.cityofkingman.gov>, or by contacting a customer service representative. Customers will notice a redesigned utility bill which provides more details about their charges.

Fire Chief—Jake Rhoades

This report is designed to be comprehensive of performance and provide a realistic snapshot of service delivery as well as the ability to provide information that is more readily analyzed in comparison to timeframes, locations, and other pertinent comparisons. This report identifies distinguishable data in each division of the department allowing for a comprehensive look at the organization regardless of area of interest as obviously one division reflects the others as well as the organization as a whole.


The department completed promotional processes for the Position of Captain, Engineer, as well as two Firefighters. Matt Wolsey, Chris Chavez, Ricardo Garcia, and Freddie Batista were each promoted to these respective positions. In addition, Christina Pacheco was promoted to the position of Communications Supervisor. The 911 Communications Center continues the hiring process as there are 5 openings which is one-third of the authorized staff for dispatch.

The month of April included response to 695 incidents, which brings the annual total for 2019 to 2656 which is already demonstrating a slight increase over 2018 as the department will likely break the 8000 call mark in 2019. This does not account for responses for Alpha level calls or non-emergent in our community which AMR handles accounting for 123 calls in April and 463 years to date. Squad 2 continues to be a very strong concept in response profile for the department as it responded to 35


Total Response Time Compliance % - ALL CALLS





For the month of April 2019, the Kingman Fire Department engaged in a variety of training topics pertaining to; fire after-action review, fire/ems software training, mass casualty incidents, community risk reduction, hazardous materials, physical fitness, chief officer development and dispatch center career development. KFD firefighter personnel also participated in fire impromptu drills, with a focus on PPE, SCBA's, and ground ladder deployment. The KFD firefighter personnel have also been working diligently for the month of April to complete other core competency training by utilizing NFPA based minimum company standards forms. These core competencies are meant to enhance proficiency in five core competencies that are central to firefighter training and our operational readiness (ladders, SCBA's, safety and survival, fire suppression, and timed evolutions). Additionally, the Kingman Fire Department conducted a successful promotional process that concluded with the additions of a new Fire Captain, Engineer, and two Firefighter positions. The total amount of training hours for the Kingman Fire Department for April was 2,604.



Community Risk Reduction presented 18 Public Education classes to area school reaching approximately 742 students and faculty with bicycle safety. We held or were a part of 11 public outreach events reaching about 629 members of the public ranging from assistance to people at the Kingman Area Food bank to teaching proper use of fire extinguisher with our mobile prop. 





DATES TO REMEMBER

- May 16th—5:30 p.m.—16th Annual KPD Awards Ceremony

Calls for service and Officer initiated activity numbered 3,259 in the month of April marking a 11.23% decrease in comparison to 2018. Written reports are down 5.12% since April 2018 and officer initiated activity is down 37.24% in comparison to the year prior.

April Activity

Testing for police officer positions was held over April 2nd—4th. The department received 75 applications of which 45 passed the initial screening. Of those, 32 confirmed their attendance in the testing process. Twenty candidates showed up on April 2nd. Fifteen of the 20 passed the written examination and 10 passed the physical agility test.



The 10 candidates showed up on April 3rd for assessment center testing and oral board interviews. Five candidates passed the interview and have been submitted for background investigations.



Area law enforcement agencies and the GEO Prison team gathered on April 13th at Centennial Park to provide support for Special Olympics in our area.



The KPOA and Easter Bunny were on hand at Walmart on April 20th for a photo opportunity. Over 170 photos were taken with the Easter Bunny and officer received 154 pounds of donated groceries for the Kingman food bank and \$509.00 in cash donations to support youth activities in the community.

** Vehicle vs Pedestrian Crash

**

On Thursday, April 4th, at about 6:30pm, Kingman



Police responded to a vehicle vs pedestrian crash in the intersection of E. Andy Devine Ave. and N. 4th St. The investigation determined that a 2006 Toyota Tacoma, driven by a 45 year old Utah man, was westbound on E. Andy Devine Ave. when it struck a 71 year old Kingman man that was in the crosswalk. The 71 year old man, who received serious life threatening injuries, was transported to Kingman Regional Medical Center. He was later flown to Sunrise Medical Center in Las Vegas where he is listed in critical condition. Investigators believe that the driver's vision may have been obstructed by the setting sun and clutter on the dash of his vehicle. The driver's license was also suspended. No charges have been filed, pending further investigation. Additional impairment has not been ruled out. The roadway was restricted for about 2 hours during the investigation.

**** Surreptitious Photography ****

On Thursday, April 4th, at about 3:55pm, Kingman Police arrested a 15 year old boy for Surreptitious Photography, a felony. Officers responded to a store in the 3300blk of N. Stockton Hill Rd. regarding the report of a someone taking photographs of another person while in the bathroom. The investigation determined that the 15 year old was using his cell phone to take surreptitious photographs of a subject in a bathroom stall. The 15 year old admitted to this incident and others the previous day. Evidence was located on his cellphone. He was released to his parents. His phone was seized. He will be charged via juvenile referral.

**** Warrant and Dangerous Drugs ****



On Thursday, April 4th, at about 6:15pm, Kingman Police arrested Jason Howard Elder, 40 of Kingman, on a felony charge of Possession of Dangerous Drugs and a misdemeanor warrant issued out of Kingman Municipal Court. Elder had originally been contacted earlier in the day in the 600blk of E. Andy Devine Ave. where he was found face down on the sidewalk. Due to his extreme intoxication Elder was transported to Kingman Regional Medical Center. Aware of his warrants officers later contacted Elder when he was released from KRMC, at which time he was found to be in possession of methamphetamine. Elder was booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility.

**** SCAM Warning to Businesses ****



The Kingman Police Department has taken several reports over the last few months where it is reported that the “scammer” calls a business and portrays being the owner or district manager of the business. The “scammer” will attempt to convince the employee to gather all of the cash from the store and obtain gift or money cards. The information on the cards is then given to the “scammer” who then redeems the cash at another location. Several employees, predominantly younger and naïve, have almost followed through when their employment is threatened. As in almost every scam the “scammer” uses fear to obtain cooperation. Many of the employees have been working alone. It is hoped that businesses owners and managers will provide training to their employees. In any scam, once money is transferred there is no chance of getting it back. Most, if not all of these scams originate from out of the United States.

**** Arrest for Child Abuse ****



On Thursday, April 4th, Kingman Police arrested Kenneth T. McIntire, on felony charges of Domestic Violence by Child Abuse and Domestic Violence by Aggravated Assault. Earlier in the day a 13 year old middle school student was found to have severe bruising and welts to his lower body. A School Resource Officer began the investigation which resulted in McIntire (father) being contacted and ultimately arrested and booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility. Investigators served a search warrant at the home and recovered the items used to strike the 13 year old. The AZ Department of Child Safety (DCS) is assisting in the investigation. The child was placed into protective custody by DCS.

**** KPD’s New Lobby Business Hours ****

Based upon a successful pilot program with the fire administration and engineering department to expand hours of service, the Kingman Police Department, beginning Monday, April 22nd, will begin a Monday thru Thursday work week, closed on Fridays. The lobby will be open from 7:00am to 6:00pm. It is hoped that this will provide the public more convenient access before and after regular work hours. Police and emergency services will not be affected by the change in hours of operation. As always, an after-hours phone is available in the lobby of the police department that provides instant access to the police dispatch center. Police Chief Bob DeVries has stated that the new hours of operation will be evaluated after a 90 day period. Feedback can be provided by sending an email to adminpd@cityofkingman.gov.

**** Credit Card Theft and Fraud Arrest ****

On Thursday, April 11th, at about 3:15am, Kingman Police arrested Julie Irene Tate, 55 of Kingman area, on felony charges of Theft of Credit Card (7 counts), Theft (7 counts), Trafficking Stolen Property, Possession of Dangerous Drugs and Possession of Stolen Property. Tate, who was suspect in the theft of a wallet on March 24th, was located Thursday morning, asleep in a vehicle in the 3100blk of Stockton Hill Rd. Tate, who admitted involvement in the offense, was also found to be in possession of methamphetamine and the associated drug paraphernalia. Pfeiffer, who was a patient in the emergency department, is alleged to have punched a nurse while he was being treated. Pfeiffer was arrested and booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility. The nurse was not seriously injured.

Officers responded to a convenience store in the 4000blk of N. Stockton Hill Rd. regarding a male subject asleep behind the wheel of a parked car. Officers arrived to contacted Underwood and observed that he was in possession of heroin and the associated drug paraphernalia. Underwood was taken into custody and ultimately booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility.

He was later flown to Sunrise Medical Center in Las Vegas with serious injuries. The driver of the van will not be charged. The roadway was closed for about :30 minutes, during which time westbound traffic was detoured around the crash scene.

**** Theft and Credit Card Theft ****

On Monday, April 22nd, at a10:15am, Kingman Police arrested Kenneth Wade Martin, 45 of Kingman area, on felony charges of Theft of Credit Card x2, and misdemeanor Theft. Martin was the suspect in the theft of a wallet from an employee breakroom the previous day. It is believed that Martin took the wallet from an employee's locker inside a business in the 3200blk of Stockton Hill Rd. sometime on Sunday. Officers located Martin at a motel in the 200blk of W. Beale St., where he was ultimately taken into custody and booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility.

**** Robbery & Warrants ****

On Tuesday, April 23rd, at about 2:00pm, Kingman Police arrested Ira Logan Fossum, 34 of Kingman, on a felony charge of Robbery and two misdemeanor warrants. Fossum was a suspect in a robbery that occurred on April 21st, at a store in the 500blk of W. Beale St. During that incident Fossum is alleged to have attempted to steal several packs of cigarettes. At one point a store clerk attempted to stop Fossum. Fossum forcibly pushed the clerk down to the ground before exiting the store and leaving in a vehicle. On Wednesday, at about 2:55pm, an officer observed Fossum to be a passenger in a vehicle in the area of the 2300blk of Fairgrounds Blvd. The vehicle was stopped and Fossum was taken into custody without incident. Fossum, who admitted involvement in the offense and had two misdemeanor warrants for his arrest on other unrelated charges, was arrested and booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility. The clerk was not seriously injured, but treated and released at the scene.

Note: Using force, or threatened use of force, during a theft turns the offense into a Robbery.

**** Weapons Misconduct & Explosive Devices ****

On Wednesday, April 25th, at about 2:00pm, Kingman Police arrested Larry W. Bradshaw Jr., 34 of Kingman, on felony charges of Misconduct Involving Weapons x3, Disorderly Conduct Weapons, Unlawful Discharge of a Firearm and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. At 1:45pm officers responded to the area of Beverly Ave. and Wilshire Ave regarding the report of someone yelling and the sound of guns shots. Officers determined that the yelling and shots originated from a structure behind a residence in the 500blk of Wilshire Ave., known to be occupied by Bradshaw. Officers surrounded the residence and structure and provided direction over loud speaker for any occupants to exit the residence.

After about 15 minutes Bradshaw did exit and was detained without incident. Further investigation revealed that Bradshaw, the sole occupant, had fire several rounds from a handgun. Several bullet holes were found in the walls of the structure. Bradshaw, who is a prohibited possessor of a firearm, was arrested. A search warrant was served that resulted in the discovery of several homemade firearms, three homemade explosive devices and assorted methamphetamine drug paraphernalia. Previous police involvements and witness statements indicate that Bradshaw appeared to be suffering increased instances of paranoia and hallucinations.

Kingman Police EOD responded and safely processed the explosive devices and rendered them safe. Bradshaw, who admitted involvement in the offenses, was arrested and booked into the Mohave County Adult Detention Facility. The investigation is ongoing.

Our Summer Brochure was available online as of midnight on May 4th and we received our first registration at 12:20am. It will be distributed in the Kingman Daily Miner on Sunday, May 5th and delivered to all local elementary schools on May 6 & 7.



Fitness & Dance: This summer, we are offering 13 Dance Camps for various ages and skill levels. Classes tend to fill up quickly so we encourage families to register early to avoid the waitlist. We will be hosting our Spring Dance Recital at Kingman High School on May 18th with two performances. The Parks Division has graciously helped the Recreation Division with building props for the musical theater class to display and utilize at the dance recital. Fitness classes are developed for this summer and revitalized the water fitness classes to be combined with new instructors.

Child Supervision Programs: The Summer Fun Daze Day camp is set with trips, supplies purchased, weekly calendars developed, and staff being processed to begin training on May 30th. Summer camp will be offered from 7:30-5:30 daily for children 6-12 years old and will include weekly trips to the pool, and off-site excursions, along with day hikes and splash pad visits, as well as many other daily activities, all included for \$75 per week.

CERBAT CLIFFS GOLF COURSE Division

Since the last report, the golf course has utilized 96 hours of inmate labor.

The golf course suffered a loss in production when the inmates we have been utilizing were removed from the City of Kingman. All winter projects that we were wrapping up for the season came to a halt and the golf course production was cut down significantly without the normal three inmates we were utilizing. Luckily, we were able to get two of three inmates back after all of the golf maintenance personnel completed inmate training again, put on by the AZ Department of Corrections and the Geo Group towards the end of the month. **Since the return of two out of the three inmates, we've been able to increase the production on the course and we're starting to catch back up with daily duties.**

Unisource Electric is almost finished pulling all the wire for their project along holes 4, 6, and 7. Once the wire is all pulled and connected, this will help upgrade the existing power infrastructure on the interior of the golf course.

We've made three applications of Primo and Proxy growth regulator on the greens this spring. This slows the Poa seed head development and keeps the greens putting smooth and true. Not only is Poa unsightly, but it can be very aggressive in our Bentgrass greens and if the Poa is left alone, can take our greens over.

An application of 0-0-50 Sulfate of Potash has been applied to all of the green complexes and to all of the tee complexes this month to help our roots stay healthy.

One application was made this month on the greens to help keep up with the Brass Buttons that has been invading the greens. The progress is slow, but we are starting to see good results.

We've begun a fertilization application on the Fairways as well this month consisting of Manganese Sulfate, Ammonium Sulfate, Ferrous Sulfate, Epsom Salt, and Soil Conditioners. All these products will help us maintain a healthier turf in our fairways.

We had one major mainline leak on hole 7 this month. We replaced an old electric valve and an old saddle along with roughly 60 feet of old blue piping. We also had an electric valve fail on hole 9 that was replaced with a new mainline saddle and roughly 20 feet of old blue piping.

The golf course received a total of 0.5" of rain for the month, allowing us to cut back on irrigation at night.

We had one incident on the course this month when someone drove a golf cart up and across #9 green. No information was found regarding the responsible party. We would like to ask all of patrons to please keep an eye out for this type of behavior and to report it if you see it.








