On behalf of the entire staff of the Kingman Police Department, I am pleased to submit our 2011 Annual Report of activity. In 2010 the department transitioned from the New World AS400 Records Management System (RMS) to a Windows Based RMS. With a merger mid-year in 2010, it made it difficult to accurately track department activity.

In 2011 we completed our first full year of operation in the new RMS which recorded 40,543 calls for service or officer initiated activity. Those numbers correlate to the increased demand in services the department has experienced since 2009.

I would like to highlight several areas of interest over the past year. The department responded to 996 traffic accidents in 2011. This marked the fifth year in a row that accidents have decreased throughout the community. Officers wrote a total of 12,500 citations and warnings accounting for a 33% increase in comparison to 2010. To further increase safety on our roadways, officers conducted 21 DUI details over a variety of holiday time periods.

While thefts overall have increased 8%, I am pleased to report that burglaries and auto theft have decreased significantly over the past year. Residential burglaries have dropped 19.34% and commercial burglaries declined 16.67% while auto theft dropped 19.48 over the course of the year.

In the beginning of 2011 the department was awarded a grant to fund a web connection with "Crime Reports". The web based program allows residents to access timely and accurate information on criminal activity occurring in the vicinity of their home or place of work. The addition of the web link proved favorable with the department recording a total of 10,167 hits during the year and "Crime Reports" marking 3,897 hits in 2011. The department is committed to researching other methods of technology and social media to increase awareness and public notification in the community.

Our Volunteers in Policing (VIPS's) Unit continues to provide a valued service to the department and community as a whole. The VIP's, consisting of 14 hard working

individuals, contributed 5,057 hours of service in 2011. They assist the department with traffic and pedestrian control, property watches, parking enforcement, parades and other special events. Our Explorer Post, which consists of youth aged 14-20 years of age, provide an additional 300+ hours of service to the department. The dedication and commitment of both groups allows the department to continue to provide a high level of service to our residents and visitors alike.

In closing, I would like to recognize and thank each and every member of the Kingman Police Department. Their commitment and professionalism is second to none, and I am honored to serve with them each and every day.

Criminal Investigations Bureau, Evidence & Property Section



The Criminal Investigations Bureau is made up of 1 Captain, 1 Lieutenant, 1 Sergeant, 4 general assignment Criminal Investigators, 2 Evidence/Property Technicians and 1 Administrative Secretary.

This past year the Criminal Investigations Bureau handled approximately 240 felony cases. 126 of these cases were cleared by arrest or other successful clearances. This gives the bureau a 70 % clearance rate for the year 2011. 43 of these cases are inactive and there are still 61 cases active and openly being investigated.

The Evidence and Property Section handled 3263 pieces of evidence or property during the year. There were 8880 items that were handled, destroyed, sold, or returned to owners. Evidence logged 2,314 photo files for the year.

The bureau gave 10 speaking engagements throughout the year covering such topics as, Domestic Violence Awareness, Robbery Prevention, Identity Theft, and Fraud.

The Administrative Secretary handled 437 business license applications.



The Kingman Police Department purchased a drug incinerator in April 2011 with drug seizure monies. It is used to dispose of marijuana and narcotic drugs that were seized from investigations and that were turned in from the Walk Away from Drugs and the Dump your Drugs events. In 2011, the drug terminator allowed us to dispose of and destroy over 7 years of stockpiled drugs from 2004 to 2011.



Homicides:

On July 18th, 2011 Kingman Police Department detectives responded to Beverly Avenue, between Lomali and Clark Streets in reference to an adult male found in the passenger seat of a vehicle deceased. It became apparent that this subject had been shot, and left at this location. Through the course of the investigation, two subjects have been arrested for this homicide and are currently being held in the Mohave County Jail.



On 01/18/2011, at approximately 0940 hours, Kingman Police Department officers responded to the Kingman Regional Medical Center (KRMC) in reference to a one year old infant girl that was brought in by ambulance for being unresponsive and in cardiac arrest. The medical staff noted bruises that suggested possible abuse.

Kingman Police detectives interviewed the boyfriend of the babies' mother and learned that he was ultimately responsible for the death of the child and is currently incarcerated in the Mohave County Jail awaiting trial.



Armed Robbery:

On Saturday September 11th, 2011 at approximately 5:40 pm, a female entered the Subway located on Hualapai Mountain Road and advised that this was a robbery. The female placed a towel on the counter and simulated that she had a weapon, and then told the clerk that this was a robbery. The female left on foot in an unknown direction. Detectives were called out and information was later obtained identifying the female as Tammy Gero. A few days later she was taken into custody and booked into the Mohave County Jail.



HOME INVASION

Kingman Police Department arrested Jesse Camacho and two juveniles in reference to the home invasion that occurred on December 18th, 2011, at 8:30pm. This incident was in retaliation for a homicide where, Michael Rivera ran over a relative of Camacho intentionally.



SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER ACTIVITY FOR 2011

For the 2010 School year the School Resource Officers (SRO's) handled a total of 1244 calls for service at the (9) nine local Kingman school campuses. In 2011 the School Resource Division's total arrests increased from 103 in 2010 to 123 in 2011.

In 2010 the SRO Division provided 312 **Law Related Education (LRE)** classes for a total of 1330 hours of LRE in the schools. In 2011 the SRO Division provided 319 Law Related Education (LRE) classes for a total of **1403 hours of LRE in the schools**. This increase in total hours can be attributed to the increase in drug awareness classes in the middle school environment and the addition of the second KPD Youth Academy which was presented during the summer of 2009 and which continued into the summer of 2010 and 2011.

The School Resource Officers completed the required training to conduct the background investigations on potential police and civilian applicants for the Kingman Police Department and during the 2011 school year over 34 background investigations were conducted.

KINGMAN POLICE YOUTH ACADEMY

The summer of 2006 was the inaugural KPD Youth Academy. This program was patterned after a similar program that Chief DeVries had implemented in Holland, Michigan. This program is designed to expose children in the middle school age (6th, 7th and 8th grade) to law enforcement. In 2007 a second academy was added and the combined academies accounted for 46 local children in those age ranges. In 2011 the Kingman Police Department continued with the two junior police academies. The Kingman Police Junior Academy Cadets were required to adhere to a Police Academy style protocol which included discipline,





daily physical training (PT), team building and evaluations. The School Resource Officers provided training in the following areas during this four (4) week training academy: Intro to the Juvenile Justice System, Probation, Courts and Laws, Drug and Substance Abuse, K-9 handling /demonstration, Crime Scene Processing and Traffic Accident Investigation. Practical Exercises, wherein the cadets actually conducted “mock investigations” were utilized in the Crime Scene and Traffic Accident portion

of the class. Guest speakers and instructors included Mohave County Attorney Matt Smith, Judge Kathy McCoy. Mohave County Probation Officer Roger Stewart and a DPS K-9 Officer who provided a class and live demonstration on the use of K-9 (dogs) in law enforcement. In 2007 Tactical training and “Building Entry” training was added and seemed to be enjoyed by the cadets.

The cadets also were given tours of the Arizona Department of Public Safety Crime Laboratory in Flagstaff. The Cadets also conducted a “mock criminal trial” with the assistance of Mohave County Attorney Matt Smith utilizing the Kingman Municipal Court room.

The cadets also completed the Mohave Community College Challenge course which is designed to develop leadership and team building. The academy and graduation ceremonies were held at the Kingman Academy of Learning Intermediate and Primary Schools.

The Mohave Silent Witness group is a non-profit organization dedicated to the apprehension of wanted suspects through the posting of rewards. Reward money is raised through fund raisers and private donations. The group is managed and operated by an independent board, separate from the Kingman Police Department. The board consists of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and board members.



Mohave Silent Witness holds monthly business meetings at the Kingman Police Department on the second Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. Anyone interested in being part of this organization is welcomed to attend.

This year Silent Witness paid out \$2,000 dollars for 3 different cases leading to the arrest and conviction of the suspects.

Callers to Mohave Silent Witness can remain anonymous. Rewards are paid for information leading to prosecutable cases.

M.A.G.N.E.T.

(Mohave Area General Narcotics Enforcement Team)

M.A.G.N.E.T. is comprised of five separate Law Enforcement agencies: the Arizona Department of Public Safety, Mohave County Sheriff's Office, Lake Havasu City Police Department, Bullhead City Police Department, and the Kingman Police Department, which is the "lead agency." The Mohave County Attorney's Office houses three prosecutors in the M.A.G.N.E.T. office located in Kingman. These prosecutors not only prosecute cases generated by M.A.G.N.E.T. detectives, but they also provide legal advice to help detectives develop sound cases.

Highlight Cases

On May 10, 2011, Mohave Area General Narcotic Enforcement Team detectives assisted K-9 Officer B. Greene after he stopped a vehicle and identified indicators of criminal activity. During a consent search of the vehicle, a large amount of U.S. currency was discovered. Detectives interviewed both suspects in regards to the money. Statements gained through the interviews indicated they were traveling from Oklahoma City, OK. To San Francisco, CA. to purchase marijuana and mail it back to Oklahoma. The suspects also had a vacuum sealing machine, vacuum seal bags, bubble wrap and boxes that were purchased at a Wal Mart in Flagstaff, AZ. As a result of the investigation, approximately \$43,000 in U.S. currency and the packaging material were seized.

On May 12, 2011, Mohave Area General Narcotic Enforcement Team detectives assisted Sgt. J. Olney after he stopped a vehicle and identified indicators of criminal activity. A search of the vehicle revealed three pounds of high grade marijuana and one pound of hash. Detectives interviewed both suspects and were informed they were transporting the contraband from Arcadia, California to Santa Fe, New Mexico. After further discussion with detectives, the suspects agreed to conduct a controlled delivery to New Mexico. As a result of the controlled delivery, approximately \$40,000, thirteen pounds of marijuana and one pound of hash were seized.

On August 03, 2011, Detectives conducted a controlled delivery operation to Arkansas. A rental vehicle was utilized to transport the methamphetamine to Arkansas. As a result of the controlled delivery, 30 lbs of methamphetamine was delivered to Arkansas State Police and approximately \$71,000 was seized in Arizona.

On November 11, 2011, Mohave Area General Narcotics Enforcement Team detectives assisted DPS officer Cortez after he discovered contraband during a traffic stop that resulted in a consent search. Detectives conducted interviews of both suspects and discovered they had been paid to drive from Artesia, NM. to Ontario, CA. and then back. While they were in California, a Hispanic male gave them a bag containing contraband and more cash. As a result of this investigation, six pounds of methamphetamine, one pound of cocaine and \$1,231 in U.S. Currency was seized.

On December 21, 2011, Mohave Area General Narcotics Enforcement Team Detectives assisted DPS K-9 Officer Greene with a traffic stop that resulted in the seizure of marijuana and cannabis. Officer Greene stopped a U-Haul moving van on I-40 and received consent to search the cargo area of the van. Officer Greene detected the odor of marijuana and had the vehicle moved to the highway patrol office for a safer environment to search. Located in the van were 9,000 chocolate bars and assorted sweet treats which contained oil extracted from marijuana. Statements gained from the interviews of the suspects indicated they were going to deliver the "treats" to New York, Pennsylvania and North Carolina. The suspects spent the ten days prior cooking and baking the goods. The candy chocolate bars are sold wholesale for \$5.00 each with retail at \$10 per chocolate bar. By statute, any oil or derivative from the marijuana plant is cannabis which is considered a narcotic. In total, approximately 1,700 lbs of "treats" and \$1,323 was seized.

G.I.I.T.E.M.
(Gang and Immigration Intelligence Team Enforcement Mission)



GIITEM is a statewide multi-agency task force consisting of five districts that provide gang and illegal immigration enforcement and intelligence services. The two Mohave County squads are part of the Northern GIITEM district.

Eight detectives and two sergeants make up the two Mohave County squads. The enforcement squad consists of four detectives and a sergeant, and the investigations squad consists of four detectives and a sergeant. Detectives are based in Kingman, Bullhead City and Lake Havasu City. The Kingman Police Department has two detectives assigned, the Bullhead City Police Department has one detective assigned, the Lake Havasu City Police Department has one detective assigned, and the remaining 4 detectives and 2 sergeants are from the Arizona Department of Public Safety.

While the unit's primary area of responsibility is in Mohave County, it is also utilized around the state for special details, enforcement efforts and investigations.

GIITEM is one of only a few true multi-agency statewide gang task force programs in the country. GIITEM's unique approach brings together law enforcement and prosecutorial agencies from municipal, county, state, federal and tribal jurisdictions in a coordinated, intelligence-driven approach to deal with gangs and violent human smuggling organizations on a large scale. Traditionally, Arizona agencies addressed the gang and illegal immigration problem individually rather than collectively. This separate approach resulted in displacement rather than focused and directed gang and illegal immigration enforcement efforts and identification. The primary benefit of the GIITEM task force is the combined resolution of the involved agencies and citizens, who ultimately are the recipients of the project's services, to cripple gangs and human smuggling organizations in the state rather than displacing these problems into adjoining jurisdictions.


GIITEM's anti-gang efforts are directed into three areas: enforcement, intelligence gathering and training.

2011 Highlights Mohave County Investigations Unit:

Covert Underage Buyer (CUB) Detail in Kingman

On March 25, 2011, Mohave County GIITEM Investigations Unit conducted a Covert Underage Buyer (CUB) detail in the Kingman area for compliance with the possession and sale of a vapor-releasing substance containing a toxic substance law; A.R.S. 13-3403. five (5) out the twelve (12) businesses checked sold aerosol spray paint to the 15-year-old CUB, which is a class 5 felony. All twelve (12) businesses were found in violation of subsection D, requiring the posting of signs warning of the dangers of inhaling vapor releasing substances.

Criminal Street Gang “Land Pirates”

On April 11, 2011, the Mohave County GIITEM Investigation Unit received a report of criminal damage graffiti occurring in the downtown Kingman area and on a local church. The graffiti read “LP,” which later was found to be identified as the “Land Pirates.” Mohave GIITEM Investigations detectives, along with the Kingman Police Department conducted follow up interviews at a nearby residence, where suspects in the criminal damage were believed to reside. During the interview, detectives discovered similar tagging in the residence that was found in the neighborhood and on the church. Detectives subsequently wrote a search warrant into the residence and seized spray paint cans, drug paraphernalia, and an explosive device (pipe bomb). The investigation led detectives to Flagstaff, Arizona, where Mohave GIITEM Investigations detectives and members of the Coconino County G.I.I.T.E.M. Squad conducted additional interviews at a Flagstaff apartment building. Detectives were able to identify three more suspects involved in the tagging through these interviews. This case has provided detectives the information needed to classify the Land Pirates as a criminal street gang. In all, seven suspects have been documented as members of a criminal street gang and arrested with felony criminal damage, possession of drug paraphernalia, and possession of an explosive devise.



“Land Pirate Killers” in Kingman

On June 27, 2011, Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detectives were contacted by the Kingman Police Department and Mohave County Sheriff’s Office reference new gang related graffiti “LPK”. The graffiti is Anti-LAND PIRATE, believed to be LAND PIRATE KILLERS. Over the weekend of June 24-27, 2011 over 15 businesses and residential areas in the Kingman area were tagged with the “LPK”. During the investigation Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detectives, identified 5 suspects who were subsequently arrested and charged for Criminal Damage and Assisting a Criminal Street Gang.



Armed Robbery in Kingman

On July 27, 2011, a Mohave County GIITEM detective arrested a 22-year-old suspect within an hour of an armed robbery at the Kentucky Fried Chicken on Stockton Hill Rd. in Kingman. The suspect was found hiding behind an apartment complex just before 5 p.m. by the GIITEM detective who had heard the call over his KPD radio and responded to the area to assist. The suspect was arrested after a brief foot chase. The suspect reportedly matched the description of a man who entered the KFC just an hour earlier and brandished a handgun while demanding money from the cash register. The suspect was also wanted on a felony warrant for his arrest.

Land Pirates Investigation

August 2011, Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detectives have spent most of the month of August following leads and conducting interviews in reference to the June 2011, Burglary and Criminal Damage involving several “LAND PIRATES”. There was only enough evidence in the case to charge one suspect with 3rd Degree Burglary and Criminal Damage.

Berry Street Bloods Street Gang

During the month of September, Mohave County GIITEM Investigations initiated a new investigation into a previously undocumented group of juveniles calling themselves “Berry Street Bloods”. The Berry Street Bloods are responsible for committing Criminal Damage by Graffiti in the Kingman area.

On September 14, 2011, Mohave County GIITEM Investigation detectives contacted a suspected Berry Street Blood gang member riding an unregistered ATV on the roadway. When a traffic stop was attempted, the suspect failed to stop for several blocks attempting to avoid the police contact. When suspect finally stopped he was told he was under arrest.

The suspect then attempted to run away to avoid an arrest. The juvenile suspect was subsequently apprehended and later released to his mother.

Operation Class Clown

On November 1, 2011 at approximately 1530 hours, the Mohave County GIITEM Investigation Unit (GIU) conducted the first detail of Operation Class Clown. The Mohave GIU detectives conducted an enforcement detail at 4185 Bank St. which is an abandoned strip mall that is across the street from the Kingman High School. This property has become a local “hang out” for the Juggalos street gang and their associates and has been the location of several recent gang fights. The property is clearly posted with several “No Loitering” signs, which helped Mohave GIU detectives disperse a crowd of about 30 people. Mohave GIU detectives conducted eight consent searches including one vehicle consent search. These searches lead to the arrest of an 18-year-old male who was loitering with friends to talk to Kingman High School students. The subject was found in possession of drug paraphernalia and several alcoholic beverages. A second 18-year-old male who was reportedly waiting for his high school aged girlfriend, was arrested for a felony probation violation warrant. This subject was also found to be possession of a pair of brass knuckles and a concealed homemade “blackjack weapon”.

Operation Northern Exposure

On November 16, 2011, the Mohave County GIITEM Investigations Unit conducted four search warrants on members and associates of the Decoto XIV criminal street gang who were involved in the aggravated assaults, felony criminal damage, burglaries, and the furtherance of a criminal street gang that occurred on November 13, 2011 at two residences in Kingman, Arizona. It is believed that one of the suspects was in Kingman visiting gang members in the area. The Mohave County Sheriff’s Office and the Bullhead City Police Department’s SWAT teams were used to conduct the entries on the residences due to the known violence potential of Decoto XIV criminal street gang members. During the searching of the residences, items from the burglaries were recovered that included a 42” flat screen TV, Play Station 3, and an iPod. Items of gang indicia were also recovered from each of the search warrant locations showing membership and/or affiliation to Decoto XIV criminal street gang. Other items of evidence seized were marijuana, drug paraphernalia, computers and various other types of electronic communication devices. Two of the wanted suspects from the aggravated assault case were outstanding at the time of the search warrants with information being received that both suspects were still in the Kingman area. Shortly upon the completion of the search warrants, one of the wanted suspects turned himself in to the Mohave County Sheriff’s Office.

Active Methamphetamine Lab

On December 21, 2011, Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detectives, with the assistance of MAGNET, DPS SOU, the DPS crime lab, and DEA, served a search warrant at a residence in Kingman on an actively operating methamphetamine lab. A GIITEM detective had received information that a lab was at the location and that the alleged cook was a former cook for the Hells Angels. The suspected cook had made threats in the past vowing not to be taken alive. Because of those statements and physical barriers on the property DPS SOU was used for entry. The suspect was taken off in a traffic stop by SOU prior to the warrant being served. MAGNET detectives and DPS

crime lab personnel processed the lab scene and DEA handled the hazardous material lab cleanup.

Arizona Savage Street Gang

December 19-22, 2011 Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detectives assisted the Kingman Police Department Detectives along with help from Hualapai Tribal Police Department in reference to an investigation where three suspects committed a Home Invasion, Aggravated Assault, and Assisting in a Criminal Street Gang, where members of a new Hualapai Indian Reservation gang called Arizona Savages, forcefully entered into a residence located in Kingman, Arizona. The Arizona Savages members began to assault a male occupant of the resident with a base ball bat. During the assault a female occupant retrieved a 12 gauge shotgun and subsequently shot one of the suspects. The two other suspects fled the residence. Three suspects were arrested for Assisting a Criminal Street Gang and Aggravated Assault.

Outreach Activity

On February 2, 2011, a Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detective gave a presentation on Prison Gangs to the Mohave County COJET (courts and probation) during their annual training.

On April 15, 2011, a Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detective presented a gang awareness program to six different classes at White Cliffs Middle School.

On June 2, 2011, a Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detective was asked to speak at the Kingman Unified School District Training for Administrators (i.e. Principals, Vice Principals etc.). The detective gave a power point presentation on "What is a Gang?" This covered local trends in the school system along with other gang related topics.

On June 15, 2011, a Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detective provided training at the GIITEM DLO training held at the Mohave County Sheriff's Office in Kingman. The detective taught a block on current gang trends in Mohave County as well as on overview of gangs in Mohave County.

On June 30, 2011, a Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detective attended a meeting at the Mohave County Probation Department. A presentation was given on basic gang criteria, as well as local gang trends.

On July 29, 2011, Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detectives were asked to speak at the City of Kingman Parks and Recreation safety meeting. Detective Morris gave a power point presentation "What is a Gang?" This covered local trends being seen in the Kingman area along with other gang related topics involving city parks.

On September 21, 2011, a Mohave County GIITEM Investigations detective was asked to give a "Gang Presentation" to the Kingman High School staff. The Detective presented "What is a Gang" covering the criteria of a Gang and Gang Members and local trends in the Kingman area.

On December 12-13, 2011, Mohave County GIITEM Investigations Detectives were asked to assist WALETA Police Academy during their two days of Stop and Approach scenarios.



Neighborhood Watch

Neighborhood Watch Groups: 2 active groups.



Neighborhood Watch is a program that the Kingman Police Department encourages and supports. KPD currently has 2 active Neighborhood Watch groups. KPD provides support and resources to those persons or groups that are interested in forming and operating an effective neighborhood watch. These programs fight the isolation and separation that crime can create. These groups create a bond among area residents and business, which in turn helps reduce burglaries and other crimes. KPD has found that these groups also improve the relationship between KPD and the community we serve. Anyone interested in forming a Neighborhood Watch in their area is urged to call KPD.

Coffee with Cops

In 2011 KPD held 2 **Coffee with Cops** community events. Coffee with Cops is a community outreach effort by KPD. KPD makes an effort to hold these events on a quarterly basis at neutral locations such as community parks and business parking lots. These events are held at different times and locations throughout the city. The events are advertised and posted, inviting anyone in the community to come and share a cup of coffee with members of the department. The idea is to make ourselves more accessible to the general public for questions and comments. The Kingman Public Safety Mobile Command Post is usually the meeting point and makes the event easier to find.

Channel 4 (TV-4)



Kingman Channel 4 (TV-4) is a government access channel that has allowed KPD to broadcast several seasonal programs and public service announcements that involved updates on the new 911 Emergency Dispatch Center, Annual Pumpkin Patrol, False Alarm Ordinance, School Resource Officer information and other outreach programs. This Government Access is provided by SuddenLink Cable, Inc. for use by the City of Kingman under the current cable franchise agreement. The mission of the City of Kingman

Government Access Channel TV-4 is to provide an informative and mutually beneficial link between the City and its citizens. This has proven to be a cost effective and efficient way for KPD to share information, current events and crime trends with the local community.



Providing timely and reliable information to our citizens is one of our top priorities. In January 2011 KPD partnered with CrimeReports which gave us the ability to keep the public informed on a regular basis as to what is going on in the community. The public can access the CrimeReports 24 hours a day through the KPD website. This information can also be obtained through the CrimeReports iPhone app, which is available free in the Apple iTunes store. Local citizens are able to sign up for free email alerts to stay on top of crime in their neighborhood. Crime information is posted within 72 hours. The number of hits to this link in 2011 (listed above) indicates the KPD partnership with CrimeReports has been successful. KPD hopes to raise the community's awareness that this information is available.

Transient Details

The City of Kingman's geographic location combined with the confluence of major transportation corridors makes it a natural stopping point for both motorists and transients. KPD makes every effort to be sensitive to the needs of the homeless while aggressively protecting the safety, property and quality of life of the community. KPD has maintained relationships with area shelters and resources centers which allows officers to provide resource information to members of the homeless community that are seeking assistance. Anyone interested is provided with this information. KPD recognizes the inherent criminal element associated with any transient community. It is these criminal offenders that KPD has a zero tolerance approach to. The most common types of criminal conduct are Criminal Trespass, Public Consumption of Alcohol, Disorderly Conduct, Illegal Camping and Theft. Every year KPD conducts "Transient Details" as needed. These details involve locating and removing illegal transient camps that are hidden in obscure locations within the city limits. These camps often attract multiple offenders and, if left unattended, would create a community hazard due to the collection of trash and human waste. These details have had a positive impact on crime reduction in the community.

Western AZ Law Enforcement Training Academy

During 2011, The Kingman Police Department sent two recruit officers to the Western Arizona Law Enforcement Training Academy (**WALETA**), located in Lake Havasu City for peace officer training. Officer Brandon Oktay graduated from Class 11-08 on May 20, 2011, subsequently completed his field training program, and now works independently on patrol. Officer Matthew Snay began Class 11-09 on August 20, 2011, and graduated on December 23, 2011. He is currently in the midst of the field training program.

Class 12-10 is slated to begin on January 8, 2012, with Kingman Police Officer Danny Reed taking over as the Class Supervisor. The Class Supervisor is responsible for training and discipline of police recruits. The academy structure is quasi military; designed to promote teamwork, camaraderie, and stress management in addition to a rigorous and aggressive academic schedule.

Officer Evan Kunert, who is returning to uniformed patrol duties in January 2012, has served at the academy since January 2009 and has completed six recruit classes at the academy in roles as Recruit Training Officer and Class Supervisor. Kingman Police Department has provided certified personnel to the Academy since its inception in 2007. Participation as an


Academy staff member allows for career officers to obtain valuable management and leadership skills which may be utilized in the future for promotional opportunities.

Oversight, direction and fiduciary responsibility for WALETA is provided by the Western Arizona Law Enforcement Association (WALEA), and is managed by Lieutenant Joe Archie of the Lake Havasu City Police Department. Instructors that teach the Academy curriculum are provided by WALEA agencies. Kingman Police Department provides about 25% of the instruction during each recruit class. The instructors provide training in areas such as pursuit driving, firearms, report writing, defensive tactics and law. To date, the Kingman Police Department currently employs twelve (12) certified police officers who received their certified training at WALETA.

Police Beats and Area Assignments



Police Beats are geographic areas of the city broken down for patrol assignments and statistical purposes. The City of Kingman is currently divided into 6 police beats. These beats have been established based on calls for service and geography, both natural and man made. KPD is committed to providing a timely response to both emergency and non-emergency calls for service. Officers are assigned to a specific “beat” and are responsible for calls for service and other patrol duties in that area. The officers are encouraged to develop relationships with the community and businesses in their assigned area.

HONOR GUARD



The Kingman Police Department Honor Guard was established in 2010. The Honor Guard Unit is composed of Police Officer's that volunteer their time. The unit provides honor for fallen comrades and are "guardians of the colors" which they display by escorting the National Flag during ceremonial events. The Honor Guard members include Sgt. 2011 KPD DUI Taskforce Activities

During 2011 the Kingman Police Department continued to participate in DUI taskforce operations. These operations were a combined effort by other area law enforcement agencies, such as the Mohave County Sheriff's Office, Arizona Department of Public Safety, Hualapai Tribal Police, and other agencies in the Colorado River areas.



The operations were funded through the Arizona Governor's Office of Highway and National highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) in attempts to make our community a safer place.

The Kingman Police Department hosted 21 DUI details, the focus of these were around major holidays and special area events. Our officers made 693 traffic contacts, which resulted in 35 DUI arrests. The department has continued to take up an aggressive approach to impaired drivers. The department's success can be seen not only in our area of arrests, but educating the community, increased number of saturation patrols, and additional training to our officers.



We have also continued efforts in getting the message out to the public on the dangers of impaired driving. We utilized the local Kingman Daily Miner Newspaper, a local radio station, road-side business marquees, as well as distributing hundreds of posters containing NHTSA approved artwork. The support we have received from area businesses was greatly appreciated.





The KPD also provided additional training to our officers in the area of DUI enforcement. We sponsored three specialized DUI training sessions in 2011.

We feel that the totality of our efforts show the committed effort by the Kingman Police Department in removing impaired drivers from our roads and highways.



STAT TEAM

The Serious Traffic Accident Team (STAT) was formed in 2007. The STAT Team is tasked with the responsibility of investigating and documenting serious traffic accidents within the city limits of Kingman. The overwhelming majority of accidents in the city are investigated by patrol and traffic enforcement officers with the STAT Team being called upon for the most serious accidents. Serious accidents are defined as any accident that involves a motor vehicle(s) that result in excessive property damage, involves malice, serious physical injury and / or results in the loss of life or any combination thereof.

The team is comprised of highly experienced and trained officers who ensure that thorough and comprehensive investigations are conducted and documented upon serious traffic accidents.

January 6th, 2011 (11-002457)
Serious injury crash on Stockton Hill Rd. at Hope. Motorcycle rider crashed into the back of a City of Kingman Street Department truck that was working on the roadway. The rider was air lifted to Sunrise Medical Center in Las Vegas with life threatening injuries. The rider survived and was later charged with DUI.





February 16th, 2011 (11-004433)

An eighteen year old male was struck by an oncoming train in the 2200 block of E. Andy Devine Ave.. The male was air lifted to Sunrise Medical Center in Las Vegas with life threatening injuries. The male ultimately survived his injuries.

June 8th, 2011 (11-19729)

Serious injury crash in the 100 block of W. Andy Devine Ave. A forty five year old Golden Valley woman was traveling west bound when she drove off the road edge. The vehicle drove through Locomotive Park, struck a light pole and rolled into concrete box culvert. The woman was ejected and received life threatening injuries. The woman was air lifted to Sunrise in Las Vegas. The woman survived and was later charged with DUI.





October 17th, 2011 (11-32486)
Serious injury crash in the 400 block of Anson Smith Rd. where a twenty year old Kingman resident was traveling west bound at a high rate of speed. The rider exited the roadway and struck several large rocks / fence posts. The rider was air lifted to Sunrise Medical Center in Las Vegas with life threatening injuries. The rider ultimately survived, however is paralyzed from the waist down.

November 21st, 2011 (11-36205)
Fatal traffic crash on Fairgrounds Blvd. at Valentine Ave. The driver of a Cadillac struck a twenty three year old pedestrian, knocking him to the ground. The driver of the Cadillac then came back, running the victim over a second time and dragging him down the street. The pedestrian died on scene. The driver of the Cadillac was later located and charged with Homicide as it was found to be intentional.

- Feb / Mar:** Daytime shoot consisting of the annual handgun qualification set by Arizona P.O.S.T. standards.
- April:** Daytime shoot consisting of the annual rifle qualification set by Arizona P.O.S.T. standards.
- August:** Sergeants Godfrey and Freed did a complete inventory, inspection and cleaning of all Kingman Police Department Glock pistols. During the inspections worn parts were replaced and extensive examination and cleaning completed.
- October:** Daytime shoot consisting of handgun and rifle drills. The drills included empty gun transitioning drills; multiple target drills; accuracy drills; and movement shooting.
- Nov / Dec:** Nighttime shoot consisting of handgun qualification and drills. Handgun drills included malfunction, movement, low-light and threat assessment drills.

In addition to the live firing shoots, KPD officers and staff participated in simulations training through the Laser Shot scenarios.



2011 Bomb Squad Activity



The Kingman Police Department Bomb Squad currently is composed of 3 certified bomb technicians. Each member of the squad has completed hazardous devices school at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama and certified by the FBI, recertification at Redstone Arsenal is conducted every three years as well as ongoing training. The squad also is a certified bomb squad which allows us to receive equipment at no cost from the FBI.

The bomb squad responds to explosive calls for the Mohave County Sheriffs Office, DPS, MAGNET, GIITEM, BLM and National Park Service as well as assisting the Lake Havasu and Bullhead City bomb squads when needed. The bomb squad responds to suspicious package calls, improvised explosive devices (IED's), military ordinance calls old dynamite and commercial explosives that are found. They also provide training classes in explosive recognition the duties and equipment of the bomb squad and bomb threat awareness.



Flex Detectives 2011

The Kingman Police Department Flex Team consists of one non rotational detective, Bill Fancher, and one rotating detective Adam Parrott. The objective for the Flex Team is to combat street level narcotics and quality of life issues in the City of Kingman. In addition to their regular duties they also taught various classes at the training academy "WALETA" gave various talks on a variety topics for the citizens of Kingman and assisted patrol, and assisted the Investigations Bureau with numerous robberies and murder investigations.



The Flex Squad conducted 11 search warrants resulting in numerous pounds of marijuana being confiscated along with some US currency.

Their hard work resulted in 92 arrests, 32 of those drug related.

The Flex squad also handles graffiti cases and this particular case resulted in the clearing of 14 other graffiti cases.




Our dedicated specialists routinely offer life saving pre-arrival instruction in addition to providing accurate public safety information.

9-1-1 Training Simulator

This year the Kingman dispatch center was awarded a stipend from the 100 Club of Arizona to purchase a 9-1-1 Training Simulator. This training simulator was purchased solely through the stipend awarded to the City to enhance the Communication Training Program for the Dispatch Center.

This simulator will allow newly hired communication specialists to train in multi-tasking, radio use, phone taking skills, and other areas prior to starting on the job training. This will give the newly hired employee an opportunity to get the best training to provide the highest quality of service to all persons calling into the Dispatch center in crisis.

This simulator will also be used for in-service training for our staff for continuous and proficiency skill training in various emergency situations.

Angel Tree program

For the second year, the dispatchers have coordinated with the Arizona's Children's Association to sponsor a tree of ornaments for local children in Kingman Arizona to donate gifts for Christmas. The Arizona Childrens Association is a non-profit agency that offers foster care, adoption, behavioral health, prevention programs, and other child welfare services to the children of Arizona that cannot otherwise afford these services. The Angel tree sponsors children in this program that without support from the community would not get a Christmas present this holiday. The Communication specialists got the word out and with the help of the city employees and the public; they were able to provide over 200 gifts to children involved in the program.



This year the Communications specialists got involved in recruitment at the Meth Coalition Walk Away from Drugs on October 5th, 2011. The communication specialists handed out information materials on when to call 9-1-1 and recruitment brochures during the event.



Regional 9-1-1 Dispatch Center

This past year, we the city began construction and remodel for the new dispatch center to be completed early 2012. The renovations began this past summer. The building will include three offices, a training room, and four dispatch consoles. The dispatch center will act as the emergency operations center for monitoring all of Kingman Police radio, Kingman Fire radio, Pinion Pine Fire radio, Pine Lake Fire radio, Northern Arizona Consolidated Fire radio, and Golden Valley Fire Department radio channels.



The transition to the new location will occur in the early part of 2012!

Testing

We conducted testing for communication specialist in February 2011, May 2011, and another in September 2011. We have hired nine communication specialists this year. We currently have one off training, three in training and four that had resigned during their 20 week training program.

Communications

- 2011 saw an increase in overall call volume for the City of Kingman dispatch center.
- A total of 5,768 calls were received and dispatched for the Kingman Fire Department.
- Total Police calls received and dispatched were 40, 551.
- The Dispatch Center received 46,319 Police and Fire calls for an average of 126.9 calls per 24 hour shift. This would average out to one call for service that requires a report number every 12 minutes. **This does not include non-emergency calls that dispatchers handle or radio traffic**



Emergency Medical Dispatchers

The Emergency Medical Dispatcher (EMD) is the principal link between the public in need of emergency medical assistance and a hospital. As such, we play a key role in the ability of an ambulance to respond to a perceived medical emergency. Most often, all of the information obtained is through telephone communications with a caller who often is distressed and out of control. We must have skills which allow us to match the personnel and equipment we send to the perceived emergency. Thus, we must be able to discern the nature and the urgency of the illness(es) and/or injury(ies) in a manner which allows selection of the most appropriate response.

In essence, we are the first "first-responder" and through immediate action effectively can eliminate the often deadly gaps which may occur between receipt of the call and the beginning of treatment which is delayed until after the arrival of the responding vehicles and personnel. First response consists of telephone instructions provided by our trained personnel functioning from standard, medically approved protocols. Such instructions are safe and, in many instances, is a moral necessity.

The Emergency Medical Dispatcher provides an all-important professional and life saving link in the overall chain of care and survival for persons in need of assistance.

Training in Communications

- During this year, we conducted (4) separate Communication Training Officer Classes.
- In January, all communication Specialist received VESTA 911 training.
- In January, (2) received VESTA Administrative training.
- In January, all staff received annual training.
- In April, (2) received creating & maintaining an Ethical Culture training.
- In June, (2) received Emergency Medical Dispatching Instructor certification.
- In July, (2) received Missing & Exploited children call taking training.
- In October dispatch conducted (2) public awareness classes to children in the community on anti-bullying.
- In October, dispatch conducted one public service announcement.





FALSE ALARM ORDINANCE

2011 marked the end of the fifth full year for the police department's False Alarm Ordinance. Since the program began in 2006, the department has seen a 62% reduction in false alarms.





2011 saw a 6% drop in false alarms over 2010 and an average monthly drop of 8.8%.

In 2011 the number of average monthly alarm responses dropped from 66 in 2010 to 60. Since the program's start in 2006, the average monthly alarm response has dropped from 156 to 60.




Since 2005, the police department has had a 78% drop in false alarm calls over all.

KPD also received an average of 22 alarm calls per month which were not responded to as either the calls were cancelled prior to officer arrival or the location was not registered with the department.



73.5% of the alarm calls received were false alarms, 8.2% were cancelled prior to officer arrival and 18.3% were not registered with KPD.

An average of 81 alarm calls were received total each month in 2011.



Testing & Hiring

- In the summer of 2011 the Kingman Police Department tested for one new hire police recruit position. This testing process consisted of a written test, then a physical agility test and if the candidates passed those tests, they were invited to an oral board.
- One person stood out among all of the candidates and this was Matt Snay. Matt is a local resident who attended Kingman High School and then went out of state to college. Matt decided that he wanted to become a police officer so he tested in the summer of 2011 and was offered a job and started the WALEA Academy on August 21st, 2011. Matt completed the academy on December 23rd, with top physical agility honors and started work with the department on Christmas night. Matt is currently on his field training status.
- We conducted testing/hiring for communication specialist in February 2011, May 2011, and another in September 2011. We have hired nine communication specialists this year. We currently have one off training, three in training and four that had resigned during their 20 week training program.

Annual In-Service Training

The Department conducted 8 hours of Continuing Training and 4 hours of Proficiency Training for Sworn Officers. The Training was conducted in September and November. Arizona Post mandates 8 hours of Continuous Training every year. The training consisted of the following:

The Critical Incident Stress Management/Peer Support Team

The Kingman Police Department's Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) Team was formed in the early part of 2004 and since its inception the Team has been there for the psychological "first aid" of our officers, our support staff and for outside entities when critical incidents arise or when an officer or staff member needs a Team Member for Peer Support issues.

Our eight-member Team is comprised of not only officers, but civilian staff as well. When critical incidents occur, our Team (all or in part) is activated to respond to the needs of our Kingman Police Department Family. Officers or "peers" needing Peer Support often call one of the Team members with a myriad of differing subject matters and we provide assistance in getting their questions or needs attended to.

In 2011, we had officers responding to various incidents where our Team's need was utilized. One incident alone can be very traumatic to our officers and support staff alike.

During 2011, there were 17 documented responses by our Team Members where we assisted our officers, support staff and outside agencies with either critical incidents or in the function of a Peer Supporter. These numbers can be skewed slightly due to a need of confidentiality for many of the personal issues brought before the Team.

Continuous Improvement Committee

In 2006, members from each division of the Kingman Police Department, under directive from Chief DeVries, came together and formed the Continuous Improvement Committee (CIC). CIC was created to discuss and help implement ways for the police department to “continuously improve” itself to better function as a team and better serve our community. CIC also oversees the KPD Employee Fund which helps pay for employee bereavements, weddings, retirement celebrations, child births (onsies), medical illnesses, and Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners for those working holidays away from their families.

In finding ways to better serve and work with the community, CIC is responsible for numerous community outreach projects, including KPD challenge coin and patch sales, the department’s Annual Community Christmas Tree Lighting, as well as assisting with several department projects such as fundraisers for the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics.

The AZ Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics (AZLETR) is Special Olympics International's largest grassroots fundraiser and public awareness effort. Participants of AZLETR carry the *Flame of Hope* torch throughout Arizona as it makes its journey to the Special Olympics World Summer Games or World Winter Games.

The Kingman Police Department was busy in 2011. For the second year, KPD held a fundraiser at IHOP to raise money for the AZ Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics (AZLETR). The Tip-A-Cop fundraiser was held on March 27th. Thanks to the generosity of the community and everyone who volunteered their time over \$900 was raised for Special Olympics AZ.

April marked the third year that KPD participated in AZLETR for Special Olympics. Kingman was the first leg of this one week long, multi-agency, 26th annual run, that started on April 25th. 
2011 Mohave County Fair



Redneck's Southern Pit BBQ sponsored the Pink Week Pig






The crew from the Parks Department worked for several weeks preparing this years' new tree for its big debut, including shaping the tree to help give it a classic Christmas tree appeal.


